FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

The Irish referendum — 'one fine day' in Ireland.

For it is quite conceivable, and even within the realm of practical possibilities, that one fine day a highly organized and mechanized humanity will conclude quite democratically — namely by majority decision — that for humanity as a whole it would be better to liquidate certain parts thereof. Here, in the problems of factual reality, we are confronted with one of the oldest perplexities of political philosophy, which could remain undetected only as long as a stable Christian theology provided the framework for all political and philosophical problems, but which long ago caused Plato to say, "Not man, but a god, must be the measure of all things." — Hannah Arendt (German Jewish philosopher, 1951)

The people of Ireland, by means of a national referendum, have 'quite democratically' voted to annul the most fundamental of all human rights, the right to life itself. A majority of Irish citizens, after careful deliberation, have declared the living and growing child in the womb a non-person, a mere *thing* to be liquidated without computcion.

Each person who voted to approve the taking of innocent human life, each of them *personally and individually*, now bears the guilt for each death that occurs because of their consent, *even more* than those who actually carry out the lethal deed: "The defending an ill thing is more criminal than the doing it, because it wanteth the excuse of its not being premeditated."

Dominique Barthelemy, O.P., in his reading of Genesis, sees the 'tree of the knowledge of good and evil' as 'man determining for himself what is good and what is evil.'

There is nothing dramatic in doing evil, provided man preserves a wide-awake conscience by which he can judge himself. On the other hand, St. Paul speaks of those who not only do evil, but consent to those who do it. This gradation from "not only" to "but" seems surprising when we first read it. One is inclined to say that to consent to those who do evil is not as bad as actually doing it. Yet it is in fact worse, because the man who does evil may do it in spite of himself. But the moment he consents to evil for himself and for others, he has stifled his conscience, he has eaten the forbidden fruit. And is not this the sin against the Spirit? Not only to fail to obey the Holy Spirit, but to endeavor to silence him.

I used to imagine that selling one's soul to the devil required some dark satanic ritual, like swearing an oath and signing your name in your own blood. In fact, all it takes is marking an 'x' in the box with an ordinary HB pencil. Our own Justin Trudeau has made the process of selling one's soul even easier by conveniently including an "attestation" on the application for the federal government's summer jobs program. We now know the answer to Jesus' question: "What will a man give in exchange for his soul?" **Marygrove Camp** is a residential camp situated on Georgian Bay. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul, Toronto Central Council, helps over 1,000 girls each summer, registering eligible campers through home visits. The camp is open to eligible girls ages five to 13. Marygrove provides a camping experience for children who may not otherwise have the opportunity to enjoy a camping adventure. Families who are experiencing financial or domestic hardship may contact the Society directly to determine their eligibility. The second collection will take place next weekend June 9/10.
