FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

Reading the Book of Job.

One day the sons of God [i.e., angels] came to present themselves before the LORD, and Satan also came with them. The LORD said to Satan, "Where have you come from?" Satan answered the LORD, "From roaming through the earth and going back and forth in it." Then the LORD said to Satan, "Have you considered my servant Job? There is no one on earth like him; he is blameless and upright, a man who fears God and shuns evil."

The *Book of Job* offers a meditation on the important and troubling question: "Why do good people suffer?"

Job is a good and righteous man who is struck by sudden calamity. He loses all his worldly goods, his children are killed in a tragic accident, and he is afflicted with a loathsome skin disease. With nothing left to live for his wife tells him, "Curse God, and die." In the midst of this terrible suffering Job is visited by three friends. Rather than comforting him, they take turns trying to convince him that he is being justly punished for his sins. Job defends himself from these charges, protesting his innocence and finally calling on God as his judge. God then appears, vindicating Job and rebuking his friends because "you have not spoken of me what is right, as my servant Job has."

Why do good people suffer? The simple answer from the Catechism is that suffering is an effect of original sin, the consequence of man's fallen nature. We are indeed "poor banished children of Eve, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears."

As Pope Leo XIII rightly taught:

To bear and to suffer is the ordinary condition of man. Man can no more create for himself a life free from suffering and filled with all happiness that he can abrogate the decrees of his Divine Maker, who has willed that the consequences of original sin should be perpetual. It is reasonable, therefore, not to expect an end to troubles in this world, but rather to steel one's soul to bear troubles, by which we are taught to look forward with certainty to supreme happiness. Christ has not promised eternal bliss in heaven to riches, nor to a life of ease, to honors or to power, but to longsuffering and to tears, to the love of justice and to cleanness of heart.

The *Book of Job*, instead of giving this kind of answer to the problem of suffering, offers a *meditation* on suffering.

Long ago, the small Bible study group to which I belonged worked through the *Book of Job*, chapter by chapter, over several weeks. We allowed it to speak to us as we shared our own Christian experience of suffering.

Suffering is not meaningless, nor is it a punishment from God. It is a deep mystery of our fallen human nature. But even within suffering, God grace is never absent.
