

FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

"I am not ashamed of the Gospel" - Rom 1:16

The Gospel reading for Ash Wednesday is from Matthew, chapter 6: "Beware of practicing your piety before men in order to be seen by them, for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven." Jesus does not tell us to refrain from practicing piety — on the contrary, this is taken for granted — but do it for God and the good of our souls, not for the praise of men. St. Francis de Sales comments on this passage: "Never do or say anything to win the praise of men, but also never leave anything undone or unsaid for fear of being praised (or reviled)."

In Jesus' time, piety was praiseworthy; today it is blameworthy. If you are pro-life — a position which is absolutely fundamental to the Christian faith — you cannot stand as a candidate for two of our three federal political parties. If you express an opinion on the insanity of men, who self-identify as women, competing against women in women's sports, you will be vilified as 'transphobic.' Our challenge today, as Christians, is to stand up for the faith. We need to take to heed the words of Christ: "If anyone is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will be ashamed of him."

We say that Christians are not persecuted — we are, after all, living in a 'tolerant' society in which the right of freedom of religion is enshrined in our constitution. But if one openly identifies as a practicing, believing Christian, there are consequences! I recall the acute embarrassment of a Bishop who was confronted in a radio interview with the passage in the Catechism which describes the homosexual inclination as being "objectively disordered." It brought to mind the words of St. Augustine:

The persecutor does not say to you, "Deny Christ." But Christ is the truth, and if we deny the truth we deny Christ. Why do we do it? Because we are afraid. Don't we call it a persecution of Christians when we are struggling for the truth? Well, now we are being tested one by one; each one is subjected to trial in his own particular case.

Today it is safe to self-identify as Christian only if we make it clear that we do not actually believe what the Bible teaches regarding the Ten Commandments — as long as our Christianity is no more than humanitarianism or respect for the golden rule. We can be 'Catholic' but not *Catholic*!

We only remember the first half of Jesus' admonition, "Do not practice your piety before men ..."and forget the rest, "... in order to be seen by them." Jesus is condemning hypocrisy not piety. He is condemning those who seek the praise of men instead of a pure conscience before God. As St. Paul says: "Am I seeking the approval of men or of God? If I were trying to please men, I would not be a servant of Christ."

Today, the world requires us to condemn a veritable smorgasbord of "-phobias," but we may not mention "sin." We have become afraid to say, "I am a Christian."
