## FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

#### On the Apostolic Preaching

If we could be time-ported back to the second century, and if we stepped into a local Church on Sunday morning, would the celebration of the Mass seem strange or exotic? After the reading of the Gospel, when the Bishop delivers his homily, would there be anything in his preaching that would disconcert or startle us?

Some contemporary writings have survived which give us some idea of that early Church. St. Justin Martyr, around 150 A.D, describes the Mass:

On Sunday, all who live in cities or in the country gather together in one place, and the memoirs of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, then the 'president' preaches and exhorts to the imitation of these good things. Then we all rise together and pray, and when our prayer is ended, bread and wine and water are brought, and the 'president' offers prayers and thanksgivings and the people say Amen; and there is a participation in that over which thanks have been given. And those who are well to do, and willing, give what each thinks fit; and what is collected is deposited with the 'president', who takes care of the orphans and widows and all who are in need.

St. Justin is writing for non-Christians, so he uses words that they will understand. The 'memoirs' of the Apostles are the New Testament; the 'president' is the presiding Bishop or Priest. In another place he explains that the bread and wine truly become "the flesh and blood of that Jesus who was made flesh." Here we have the earliest description of the Mass in its still familiar outline.

St. Irenaeus, a younger contemporary of Justin, wrote a short treatise *On the Apostolic Preaching*, hoping that "by means of this small work, you may understand all the essentials of the body of truth."

For the way of all those who see is single and upward, illuminated by the heavenly light; but the ways of those who do not see are many, dark and divergent. The one leads to the kingdom of heaven, uniting man to God, while the others lead to death, separating man from God. Thus it is necessary for you to make your way by faith, lest you wander from the right path. Faith is produced by the truth; for faith rests on things that truly are.

The modern translator anticipates that the reader may be somewhat disappointed because "Irenaeus does not present Christianity as a system of theological beliefs" as one finds in a Catechism. Instead, Irenaeus "follows the example of the great speeches in the *Act of the Apostles*, recounting all the various deeds of God culminating in the exaltation of his crucified Son, and the bestowal of his Holy Spirit." This 'apostolic preaching' concentrates on what Jesus did on the road to Emmaus: "And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself."
