### FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

### The Creator of all things.

One definition of 'boring' is 'answering a question that nobody is asking." I find that most people find talk about God boring. Yet what question can be more important than "What is the meaning and purpose of my life?" Can we be satisfied with an aimless and ultimately pointless existence? The ancient Greek philosopher Epicurus taught that death is the annihilation of both body and soul. In that case, the only reasonable aim in this life is to minimize one's suffering and to maximize one's pleasure. We all know people who live this way. To the extent that they succeed in their aim, they seem happy. As for death, it is inevitable, so why worry about it? As Epicurus famously said, "If I am, death is not; if death is, I am not." Epicurus' philosophy is neatly expressed in the words of the atheist bus ad: "There's probably no god. Now stop worrying and enjoy your life."

But what if God probably does exist? Actually, if you believe that everything has a cause — as every rational person does — then the probability of God (capital "G') *not* existing is zero. Every thing does in fact have a cause. The scientist, more than anyone else, accepts the truth of this statement because science is 'the knowledge of the causes of things.' The 'new atheist' of course counters with the question, "If every thing has a cause, then what caused God?" The simple and obvious answer to this question is, "God is not a 'thing'." God is not even a 'being.' Technically, it is even wrong to say that God 'exists.' God is source of all existence. God is the source of all being. God is 'real' because he is the source of all reality. There most definitely is a God. He created this universe of 'things' and he also created you.

According to the Book of Wisdom (one of the books of the Old Testament that deserves to be much better known): "For all men who were ignorant of God were foolish by nature; and they were unable from the good things that are seen to know the one who exists, nor did they recognize the craftsman while paying heed to his works; but they supposed that either fire or wind or swift air, or the circle of the stars, or turbulent water, or the luminaries of heaven were the gods that rule the world. If through delight in the beauty of these things men assumed them to be gods, let them know how much better than these is their Lord, for the author of beauty created them. And if men were amazed at their power and working, let them perceive from them how much more powerful is he who formed them. For from the greatness and beauty of created things comes a corresponding perception of their Creator."

God is real, and that fact has real implications. It means that life matters; *every* life matters, and how we live our lives matter. God *does* exist; deal with it.

# **Preventative Measures in Place (COVID-19)**

**The Archdiocese of Toronto** continues to work with health officials to monitor the local situation regarding active cases of the coronavirus (COVID-19). At this time, **Cardinal Collins has asked all parishes to implement the following measures:** 

- At the Sign of Peace, refrain from shaking hands a simple bow, nod or "Peace be with you" to your neighbour is appropriate.
- For parishes offering communion under both species, forgo the distribution of the Precious Blood from the chalice for the congregation at this time.
- Parishes should ensure that those distributing communion wash their hands or use hand sanitizer before and after the distribution of communion.

Please also continue to practice healthy hygiene – wash your hands with soap or use hand sanitizer regularly, remain home if you are sick, sneeze/cough into your sleeve and avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Let us continue to care for ourselves and one another as we pray for all those impacted worldwide by COVID-19.
